Ornamentation Policy for Burial & Cremation Memorials

Plastic vases are provided for the use of persons who would like to place fresh or ornamental flowers. A maximum of two vases per memorial is permitted. Vases are to be placed wholly within the memorial beds (i.e. the gravel or mulched area surrounding the plaque. The grassed areas are not to be used.) We do not accept any liability for the loss or damage of any items placed. The only plaque permitted is the granite plaque supplied by Manning Great Lakes Memorial Gardens Pty Ltd (MGLMG PTY LTD). The only Photo Tiles are to be supplied by MGLMG PTY LTD. NO COLOURED STONES, SAND, or GLASS ETC TO BE PLACED ON ANY BURIAL OR MEMORIAL POSITIONS. Annual clean-up and maintenance of the Memorial Gardens may see the ground staff remove any faded or damaged flowers and memorabilia etc. Should complaints be received regarding the loss or damage of any placements we will have no option but to enforce the policy that the only placement permitted will be fresh flowers placed in vases supplied by MGLMG PTY LTD.

Cemetery Ornamentation Guideline

MGLMG PTY LTD acknowledges that the need to place items on a loved one's grave may be vitally important in the grieving process. MGLMG PTY LTD regrets any distress that may be caused by the removal of unapproved items/articles. MGLMG PTY LTD must meet the requirements of public liability, the NSW Occupational Health and Safety Act 2000, and the NSW Occupational Health and Safety Regulation 2001. Unapproved items/articles may breach these obligations. MGLMG PTY LTD retains the right to request compliance with their regulations regarding items/articles that have an undesirable visual appearance and/or intrude into work areas creating a risk to workers and visitors in the cemetery/crematorium. We also retain the right to protect their property, both real and intellectual.
